
## Umpqua Discovery Center

The idea for the Umpqua Discovery Center was generated as a result of the City's efforts to revitalize the failing economy of the City of Reedsport in the 1980's. In 1985, City staff attended a conference sponsored by the Oregon State University School of Oceanography on Riverfront Revitalization. The underutilized waterfront area, which was isolated by a long dike wall built for flood protection in 1964, became the focus of a major new undertaking,

Desiring to capitalize on the beautiful Umpqua River and the surrounding area, City officials declared tourism as a target industry and made Riverfront Revitalization a priority project on their list of goals.

In 1986, a steering committee was formed from the public and private sectors of the community. The original philosophy of the Center was for it to be the center of activ-

ity that allowed for discovery and exploration of the surrounding area. The actual design of the Center is close to the design of the cannery that used to be situated on this site.



Over 2,000 students from area schools visit the Center each year and learn a wealth of information from their tour guides. In addition to the two exhibits, educational programs are offered such as 'Animal ID' & 'Becoming a Bear'. The Outreach Programs reach even more students. The US Forest Service and Confederated Tribes of the Coos, Lower Umpqua, and Siuslaw Indians also provide educational programs from tribal history to natural resources.

Over the years, the Center has hosted several events and continues to provide Outdoor Summer Concerts. In 2010, partnering with Douglas County Museum and Jim Akre, the Center produced a History Video 'Reedsport-The City on Stilts' and a book 'Images of America - Reedsport'.

The success of the Umpqua Discovery Center has been due to the vision of Reedsport citizens, the willingness of the community to support this vision, the ability to capitalize on a common interest in history and natural history, and numerous volunteer hours.

## HANG UP AND DRIVE

#### **Distracted Driving in Oregon**

- "Distracted Driving" is a dangerous behavior for drivers, passengers, and non-occupants alike. Distraction is a specific type of inattention that occurs when drivers divert their attention from the driving task to focus on some other activity instead (per NHTSA).
- ⇒ From 2014-2018 there were 13,603 fatal and injury crashes resulting in 137 fatalities and 20,992 injuries caused by crashes involving a distracted driver in Oregon (all ages).
- ⇒ 2014-2018 There were 1,193 fatal and injury crashes involving a driver (all ages) reported to have been using a cell phone at the time of the crash: 18 fatalities and 1,752 people injured.
- ⇒ 2014-2018 There were 124 fatal and injury crashes involving a driver age 16-18 reported to have been using a cell phone at the time of the crash.
- ⇒ 2014-2018 There were 65,138 convictions for this offense.
- Distracted driving occurs when a driver voluntarily diverts attention to something not related to driving that uses the driver's eyes, ears, or hands. This includes visual, auditory, manual and cognitive distractions.

The Reedsport Memorial Day Parade Committee has always appreciated the participation of the community in our annual "A Salute in Remembrance" on Memorial Day Weekend. ### A message from Fire Chief Tom Anderson about the upcoming 2021 fire season:

For the 9th year in a row, the Fire Department will stop issuing burn permits when Coos Forest Protective Association declares that fire season has started. This usually occurs near the end of June, depending on weather conditions. We urge residents to call the Fire Department if you want to burn prior to the start of fire season.

The reasons for this policy change are:

- \* To protect the welfare of the community
- \* Reduce the cost of fire operations
- \* Alignment with neighboring fire protection agencies
- \* To provide for firefighter safety

Warming fires, otherwise known as campfires or recreational fires, (for cooking and other non-debris burning



activities on private property), are still allowed year around, (except during extreme fire danger, and do not require a permit. We ask that you burn safely and responsibly. Use clean, dry firewood, do not leave the fire unattended, put it out completely when finished, and be aware of smoke intrusion in your neighborhood, which is regulated by City Ordinance 6.08.020(1). # Fundraising Effort for Reedsport K9 Shelter

The Reedsport K9 Shelter has been working with Downeyville Productions to create a new logo for the shelter and now has sweatshirts, t-shirts and tote bags for sale. Reedsport K9 Shelter operates on donations from our community and supporters. The shelter is operated under the Reedsport Police De-



partment and ran by a group of dedicated volunteers to ensure all dogs in our facilities needs are met. The dogs are able to have "adventure days" where they go on hikes and explore with our volunteers.



The Shelter has been working with S.T.A.R.T., a rescue in California that transports dogs from overcrowded shelters to no-kill shelters along the coast to find their forever homes. When meeting for these transports, the shelter will take as many dogs as we

#### **Senior Center News**

The Lower Umpqua Senior Center has operated out of its current location at 460 Winchester since 1989; that same year the center was incorporated as (LUCC, Inc.) a 501(c) (3) nonprofit operating under a volunteer board of directors. The board currently has five members and is always looking for additional board members and volunteers. Douglas County Housing Authority provides the land for the building, which is maintained by the City of Reedsport and LUCC, Inc.

Through Douglas County Senior Services, the Center's commercial kitchen is leased to Bateman Services to prepare and serve home-bound seniors and disabled citizen's meals three-days a week. Meals are served on Tuesdays, Thursdays' and Fridays. The meals are prepared and delivered throughout the community in two vans maintained by the nonprofit and driven by volunteers; funding is provided through grants and donations. Although the Center is currently closed, they are providing curbside pickup and delivery for those in need. If you are interested in volunteering or in need of the program please contact Karen Robertson (Douglas County Senior Services) at 541-271-6211 for information and assistance.

The program continues to seek volunteer drivers whom are willing to give 2-6 hours per week to deliver and prepare meals for citizens. Volunteers will need to complete a County volunteer application and submit to a background check.

The Center is not currently accepting equipment donations such as wheelchairs, walkers or other items due to the sanitation requirements of the pandemic. If you would like to help seniors in our area, please consider a monetary donation to help offset the fundraising deficit the pandemic has caused. All donations are tax deductible and go to help individuals right here in our community.

The Center's nonprofit board also oversees the AARP Food Pantry located in Henderson Park at 810 Greenwood Avenue. Currently the Pantry is overflowing with generations donations of non-perishable goods and the Pantry is seeking families and individuals in our community who could benefit from these generous donations.
