CITY RECEIVES FUNDS TO DECREASE COMMUNITY WILDFIRE RISKS

Many remember the devastating wildfire season of 2020 and the desolation to our County and the State which stretched to the coast regions. Douglas County spent months in Level II evacuation status and for some the sounding of each fire alarm stood the hair on the back of our necks up. We often feel isolated from the valley communities in our County, yet that same forest stretches to our backyard and as we all know, wildfire knows no limits.

In an effort to help eliminate wildfire fuel, increase awareness and defensible spaces to reduce potential structure loss during a wildfire; in January of this year, City staff prepared and submitted a grant application to the Oregon State Fire Marshall's Office under the Community Wildfire Risk Reduction program. This competitive grant program was open to local governments, special districts, structural fire service agencies, and non-governmental organizations in the State of Oregon. Funds are for wildfire risk reduction projects, equipment, and staff for local efforts. The projects will help protect people, property, and communities from wildfire and better prepare communities for wildfire impacts, creating a more fire-adapted Oregon.

Our application highlighted two major projects. The first project is to survey trees and brush on city property which immediately borders homes and structures to identify dangerous, diseased trees. Which will result in the removal of ladder fuels, (or debris that allows fires to spread up) ensuring adequate spacing between trees (12 feet) and ensuring that mature trees and other vegetation are no closer than ten feet to the edge of a structure. Additional work will include disposing of ground litter and debris, removing dead plant and tree material, removing vegetation adjacent to structures, and ensuring proper spacing between structures and the canopy tops.

The second project is to continue to assess trees within Bicentennial Park, the 19.5 acre forested park within the residential area of Forest Hills,. According to the USDA dying trees may increase fuel loads and the risk of fire while insect infestations and disease can cause mixed-severity or stand-replacing fires and to decrease the likelihood of a tree to die and fall to the forest floor, risking the increase of fire again. With half of the wildfires caused by humans each year, addressing this popular area is vital to the surrounding neighborhood.

The City of Reedsport was notified on May 1, 2023 that our application was approved for \$145,000 to complete both projects within two years. Staff will be reaching out to agency partners to begin these projects and fulfill not only the grant requirements but these vital projects for the continued safety of our community.

🔭 Summer Safety Tips from the Reedsport Police Department 🤺



Summer is here! The end of the school year means more kids are out and about, especially in neighborhoods. Parents and caregivers play an essential role in keeping kids safe while enjoying summer activities. There will also be an increase in traffic through town, be alert when driving and when out in public. The rules for driving do not change during the summer months, but the challenge does. Go into it with your eyes wide open and safety on your mind.



Safe Driving Around Kids

- When driving, pay attention and scan the entire area around you.
- Look for kids playing near the street and slow down. Children are often unpredictable and unaware of danger around them.
- Slow down around children and other pedestrians.
- Watch for people about to step off the curb at crosswalks.

Neighborhood Safety Tips

- Never let your child walk anywhere alone, whether to the store, to a friend's house, or to the park.
- Never let your child play outside alone. Predators may cruise neighborhoods looking for unsupervised kids. Take turns with other parents in your neighborhood or enlist a trustworthy family member to help.
- If your child rides bikes, roller blades, or skateboards, make sure they are always with two buddies.
- Report any suspicious strangers or vehicles in the neighborhood to police.

Summer Activity Tips

- Teach kids to appreciate and respect EMS professionals, firefighters and police officers, and when and how to dial 911 in an emergency.
- Always wear a helmet when biking, skateboarding, roller skating or riding a scooter.
- Always stop at STOP signs and look both ways before crossing the street.
- Use sunscreen and wear sunglasses to protect your skin and eyes from harmful solar rays.
- Use care when eating foods like hotdogs, grapes and hard candy or cut them into smaller pieces to prevent choking.
- Never allow unsupervised children to play near or swim in streams, pools, retention ponds or other bodies of water.

2023 FIRE SEASON DECLARED

For the 11th year in a row, the Reedsport Volunteer Fire Department will not issue burn barrel or debris burning permits within the Reedsport City limits for the 2023 fire season. There will be no exceptions to this policy for the duration of fire season.

The Fire Department will stop issuing permits on Friday, June 9th 2023. This will occur the same day Coos Forest Protective Association declares fire season is in effect in thier area.

The reasons for this policy are:

- * To protect the welfare of the community
- * Reduce the cost of fire operations
- * Alignment with neighboring fire protection agencies
- * To provide for firefighter safety

Warming fires, otherwise known as campfires or recreational fires, (for cooking and other non-debris burning activities), are still allowed year around, (except during extreme fire danger), and do not require a permit. We ask that you burn safely and responsibly. Use clean, dry firewood, do not leave the fire unattended, put it out completely when finished, and be aware of smoke intrusion in your neighborhood, which is regulated by City Ordinance 6.08.020(1).

Bicentennial Park Closure!

The North Entrance of Bicentennial Park, located off of 22nd Street, will be closed for construction beginning on July 10, 2023 until the project is complete. Park Access will remain open via Ranch Road.



The Reedsport Main Street Program will re-\$200,000 matching funds for roofs, awnings, electrical and plumbing improvements to seven commercial buildings downtown Reedsport, through Oregon the

Main Street Revitalization Grant.

Funded projects include:

- 301 Fir Avenue Property is currently being occupied by the U.S. Post Office. The grant will assist with replacing its heating system.
- 302 Rainbow Plaza This property is rumored to have occupied the first Ice House in Reedsport. The grant will assist with a roof replacement.
- 339 Fir Avenue The historic Welcome Hotel has been restored to include 10 renovated upstairs apartments and two street level commercial spaces. This property will be replacing the metal awning with the grant assistance.
- 417 Fir Avenue & 242 4th Street Mindpower Gallery will be expanding its retail space and adding new services with the renovation within these two adjoining properties. With the grant assistance, they are adding a new awning to the 4th Street property, as well as updating electrical and plumbing in the interior renovation of the two properties.
- 485 Greenwood Avenue Formerly the Three Rivers Rebekah Lodge #240, this property was constructed in 1942. The grant will assist with their roof repair project.
- 489 495 Fir Avenue Long-time known as the Old Bank Building, this property has housed a variety of businesses. The grant will assist with the roof replacement.
- 776 E Railroad Avenue The Umpqua Industrial Supply Co. sits on the far west side of Reedsport's Historic District. A roof replacement is being assisted with the grant funding.



My Neighbor Keeps Parking His Car on the Street in Front of My House; Can You Do Something About It?

Actually, no. Since Public Roadways are just that, "public," no one has the right to reserve spaces in front of his or her house. However, while it is not illegal to park in front of someone else's house, it is certainly inconsiderate. Every homeowner likes the convenience of being able to park in front of their own house, and families who have an unusual amount of automobiles should make arrangements to park the extra vehicles someplace other than in front of someone else's house. On the other hand, if you encounter a vehicle which is parking in front of your house for excessive periods of time without moving, you can call the police department and ask to have the vehicle checked out. (If you don't recognize the vehicle and it hasn't moved for a long time, it may be stolen.) If the vehicle is registered to a neighbor who lives adjacent to your house, the owner is not violating any laws. If on the other hand, the vehicle belongs to someone who does not live adjacent to your house, and it remains in it's parked position for more than 24 Hours, it can be ticketed, and in some cases, towed away, for violating the City's 24-Hour Parking Ordinance. Of course, the best course of measure to take for this type of problem is to talk to your neighbor, and to try to work it out without involving the police.
